SOLVE THE ANIMAL CLUES

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OBJECTIVE

Deduce the four animals that will be featured in the live show

1. Watch the pre-show video with your students to get clues that help your students identify the four native animals that will be featured in the live show.
2. Review the Singa-Power Clues on page 4 and use the animal profiles on pages 5 –12 to identify the featured animals.
3. Watch the live show to see if you got them right!



SINGA-POWER CLUES

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A Songbird's Beak

This animal has a black beak.

A Leaf Disguise

This animal has a green, leaf-like body.

Fangs & Forked Tongue

This animal has sharp fangs and a forked tongue.

Skin Flaps

This animal has a kite-shaped flap of skin.





Chrisangi Leaf Insect

This insect has a green, leaf-like body that helps it blend in with leaves. This is called camouflage.

This makes it difficult for predators to spot it.



Gray's Twig Insect

This insect has a long, thin body that makes it look like a twig.

This helps it blend in among tree branches, making it harder for predators to spot it.



Oriental Pied Hornbill

This bird has a long yellow beak with a “horn” on top. This “horn” is also called a casque.

It makes loud calls and can be easily spotted on trees.



Straw-headed Bulbul

This songbird is known for its beautiful, melodious call.

It has a black beak, olive-green wings and a yellow head.



Oriental Whip Snake

This snake has a long, slender, bright green body.

It looks like a vine which helps it camouflage in the forest canopy.



King Cobra

This is the longest venomous snake in Singapore.

It uses its forked tongue to detect prey.

It uses its sharp fangs to inject venom into its prey.



Malayan Colugo

This mammal has flaps of skin that extend between its arms, legs, and tail.

When the animal opens its arms and legs, the skin stretches out like a kite.

The skin flap allows it to glide from tree to tree.

Smooth-coated Otter

This mammal has a smooth coat and webbed feet that help it swim quickly to catch fish.

It stays near water and lives in family groups.

CREATE YOUR SINGA-POWER COSTUME

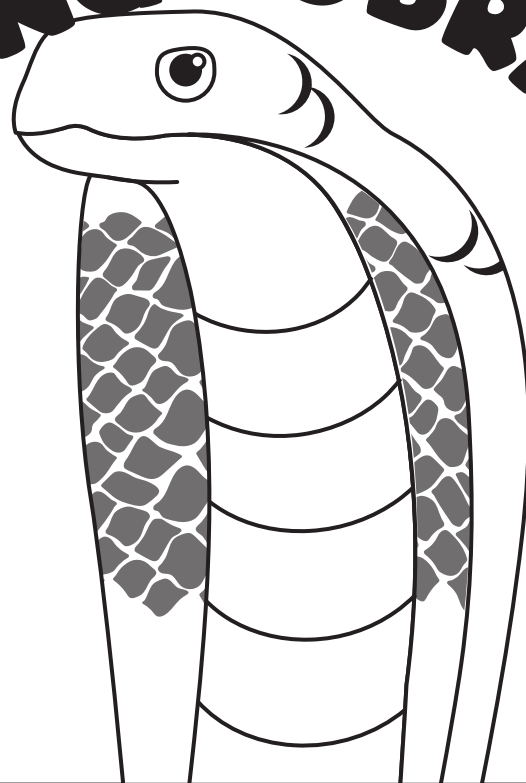

Encourage them to wear their costumes during the live show for a more immersive experience!

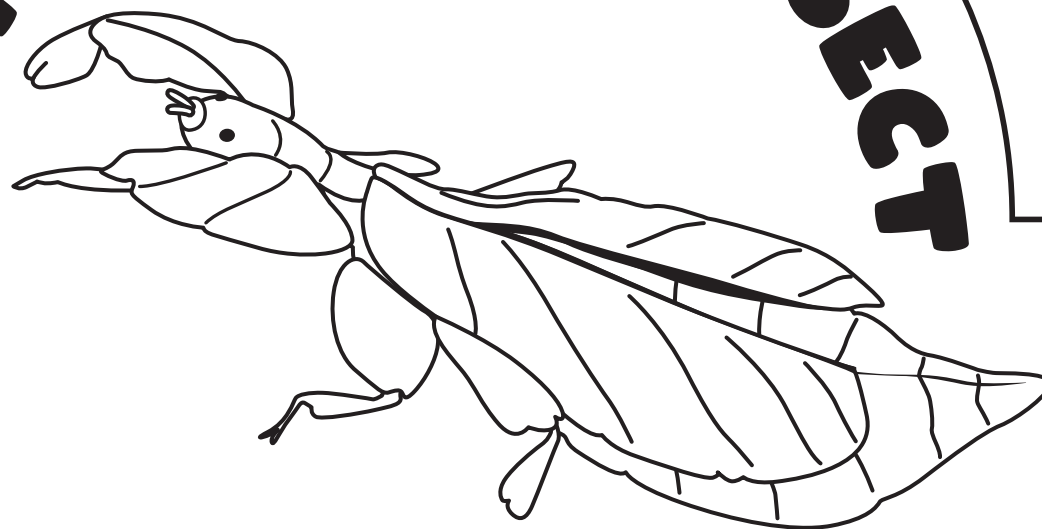

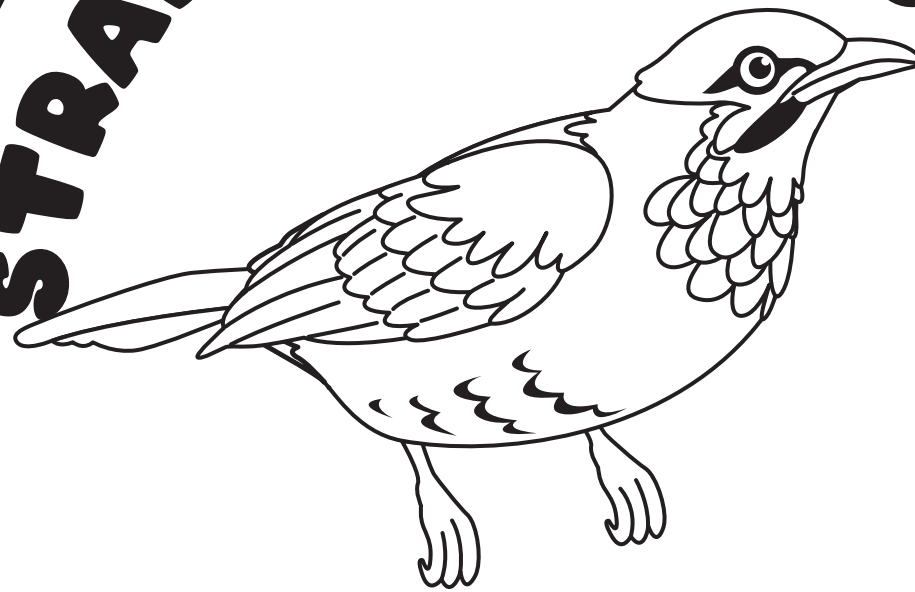


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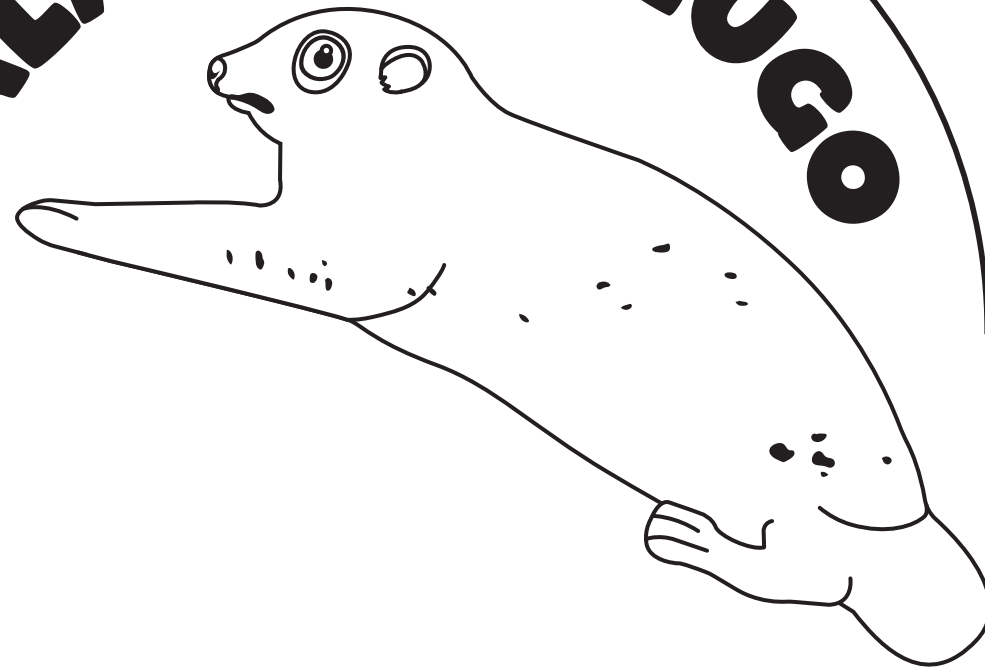
